# Dear friends,

2021 was an exciting one at the YWCA Greater Flint as we made great strides to fulfilling our vision of establishing the Women's Empowerment Center (WEC)!

Our Vision 2020 Campaign committee headed by Kathi Horton and Judy Ebbott worked tirelessly to share the exciting prospect of new programming with potential donors, raising close to \$170,000 in individual contributions. We also secured grants from the Child Welfare Society, Huntington Bank, AG Bishop Trust, and the Community Foundation of Greater Flint to support the development of the new WEC!

As we planned for the Women's Empowerment Center, we quickly came to the realization that in order to effectively expand our work and focus on the empowerment of women and girls in our community, we needed to re-engage with racial justice work since the intersectionality of race and gender plays such a significant role in women's lived experiences. As you read through this report, you will notice that we dedicated new efforts to implementing racial justice programming for community members and leaders to continue fulfilling our mission of eliminating racism and empowering women!

Our comprehensive Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault Program continued to assist victims of abuse and sexual violence to RISE OUT of violent and oppressive relationships. Serving almost 2,600 clients, we provided individuals with the tools and support to find their inner strength and determination for healing, re-define life goals, and understand the dynamics healthy relationships.

In response to surges of COVID-19, we quickly pivoted to offer virtual advocacy-crisis intervention and support group sessions as staff worked from home to ensure everyone's health and safety.



Below is a breakdown of services provided from October 2020 through September 2021:

- Personal Protection Order Requests: **451**
- Crisis Line Calls received: **1731**
- Rape Kit Examinations Completed: **109**
- Safehouse Residents served: **372**
- Number of Crisis Intervention Sessions: **974**
- Number of Victim Advocacy Sessions: **1292**

The achievement of 2021 would not be possible without a dedicated staff, board of directors, donors and community partners...we are thankful for all of their contributions and commitment to our mission. # YWCA Services

## THE HARRIET KENWORTHY CRISIS AND ADVOCACY CENTER

YWCA Advocates help each client by offering safety planning and basic needs through a wide-range of crisis intervention support services.

Advocates are available on-call 24 hours/day and 7 days/ week to assist survivors throughout the continuum of the crisis - starting with the most basic needs for housing, clothing, food, toiletries, children's supplies and safety. They assist with obtaining Personal Protection Orders (PPO) as well as accompanying a victim to court. Advocates respond to the victim's concerns in a confidential manner without interfering with the medical, reporting, investigative or court processes. They take the time to clearly explain the victim's rights and responsibilities and the choices available to them.

In addition to providing immediate intervention services, advocates use a trauma informed approach in their work to create a safe, supportive and nonjudgmental environment to help victims of domestic violence or sexual assault begin to rebuild trust, to develop a sense of security, and to reduce feelings of isolation and self-blame.

To help reduce the feeling of isolation, the YWCA offers a 12-session weekly program for victims of domestic violence, DV Encouragement Circle. These sessions are facilitated by a YWCA Case Manager and include interactive exercises and group discussion. The topics covered include: defining domestic violence and the cycle of violence, the power and control wheel, how to establish boundaries and be a self-advocate, as well as the long-term effects of violence on the victim and children. The group also focuses on self-esteem and the dynamics of healthy relationships in a safe and trauma-informed space.

## SAFEHOUSE SHELTER

The Safehouse is a 32-bed emergency shelter with supportive services for survivors of intimate partner violence and sexual assault and their minor children. The YWCA conducts an assessment with each potential resident to ensure the needs of the survivor match the services provided at the Safehouse. For individuals with needs requiring other supportive housing services, referrals are made. Residents are encouraged to engage with the resources and services designed to assist them with planning for the future.



## SAFE CENTER

The SAFE Center is available 24 hours/day and 7 days/ week to provide comprehensive medical forensic examinations to survivors of sexual assault.

With patient consent, evidence is collected and documented by specially trained, forensic nurse examiners in a safe, secure and supportive environment. Advocates are available to offer support, information and connection to additional resources. They will take time to clearly explain the victim's rights and responsibilities and the choices available to them.

## CRISIS LINE (810) 238-SAFE

The YWCA 24/7 crisis line offers trained staff who are available to respond to victims, answer questions, provide information and referrals, and assist with the intake process for Safehouse for those in need of shelter.

## SEXUAL ASSAULT RESPONSE TEAM (SART)

SART is a multidisciplinary group representing law enforcement, hospitals, and service providers who work collaboratively to ensure coordinated response and support for sexual assault victims in Genesee County.

## The YWCA Saved My Life

**TIFFANI'S STORY:** Hopelessness and fear can be overwhelming and debilitating, when trying to navigate a new life, after leaving an abusive partner who controlled the money and all aspects of life. With a child, no money and only a few items of clothing, Tiffani found the world is very frightening without support.

Housing, food, health care, and clothing—the basic items of necessity were no longer available without money. The YWCA Greater Flint Safehouse provided Tiffani with a safe place to stay and some of these basic needs along with additional resources including: a case manager within the Genesee Health System; mental health counseling; a connection to DHHS and approval for Medicaid and food stamps; a domestic violence support group; school clothes, school supplies, hygiene products, and ultimately a new pathway to an apartment and safe, independent living.

“When I came into the Safehouse I was hurt, abused, lost and depressed. I felt like giving up. Coming to the shelter helped me find myself again. I got help with my depression and anxiety and I’m no longer an emotional wreck. Everything I thought I wouldn’t have, if I left, I got—plus some. My son and I are happy and safe!”

**LEESA'S STORY:** Leesa’s husband was controlling. He limited her access to finances and resources, dictated who she could talk to (and not), denied her any decision-making opportunities, and regulated all activities. What she didn’t realize was this was not normal—all are forms of abuse—even in a marriage.

By participating in the individual and group counseling sessions at the YWCA Greater Flint, Leesa was able to establish confidence, and develop strategies for a new path towards independence and self-determination. After years of marriage, Leesa is learning to live a life without being told what to do, how to spend money, who to talk to and where she can go. She is discovering confidence in her own abilities to make decisions, be independent and self-reliant.

**OUR COMMUNITY, OUR TOWN, OUR STATE, WAS NOT SAFE.**



## Sex Trafficking

**BRANDI'S STORY:** It is not a headline about another country. It is reality for more than 16,658 individuals in the United States each year, and it became a reality for Brandi, who lived right here, in our own community.

The YWCA Greater Flint, learned about Brandi after receiving a call from the Genesee County Human Oppression Strike Team (GHOST). They indicated that a human trafficking survivor had presented at Hurley Medical Center in Flint, MI. A Sexual Assault Victim Advocate responded to the call, and offered—what they do best—a listening ear and reassurances that the survivor was safe.

Often, reassurances of safety are hard to hear and process for someone enduring a life of commercial sex by means of coercion, fraud, or force, and the advocate understands this. Utilizing a needs assessment, the advocate assisted Brandi by arranging for safe housing, clothing, food, and phone.

The option to have a sexual assault exam, completed by one of the YWCA's Sexual Assault Nurse Examiners (SANEs), was offered to Brandi but she found it to be too much at this stage, and declined. The hierarchy of need was fully operational...the basics... safe housing, food, and clothes. Once these were in place, connections to community resources were introduced for mental health care and drug use rehabilitation.

Over the next few weeks, the advocate and Brandi developed a plan for safe relocation out of Michigan. Our community, our town, our state, was no longer safe for Brandi. The next stage in relocating Brandi was integration into a survivor community to help reduce isolation. The YWCA Safehouse Shelter provided this community. Shortly after the introduction to Safehouse, Brandi was now ready to see the Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE). Timing matters. Trust matters.

With more trust came more sharing. The advocate and Brandi continued to strategize about relocation plans, support options, and safety resources. The advocate facilitated a connection with a Human Sex Trafficking shelter in another state. Additional resources in that community were also identified—food banks, advocacy centers, hospitals, and shelters—as secondary steps to follow the primary safety plan. Brandi was accompanied to the airport and provided with safe transportation to the shelter upon arrival in the new state. Brandi was successfully relocated out of Michigan, and the advocate is ready to respond again.

## History

Nearly 20 years ago the YWCA Greater Flint developed a curriculum focusing on racial justice entitled "Challenging Racism". The approach was recognized as a model for trainings and was used across the Greater Flint area. Over the years, however, with changes in leadership and program restructuring, the sessions were discontinued, leaving a part of the YWCA mission unaddressed. In the planning process for the Women's Empowerment Center, we quickly came to the realization that in order to effectively expand our work and focus on the empowerment of women and girls in our community, we needed to re-engage with racial justice work since the intersectionality of race and gender play such a significant role in women's lived experiences.

## Racial Justice Initiatives

We are grateful to the Community Foundation of Greater Flint for the financial support from the Truth, Racial Healing and Transformation Program Fund. In May of 2021, two focus groups, led by consultants Artina Carter and Traci Kim, brought together community representatives from education, health care, housing, higher education, and non-profits to engage in a critical conversation about racial justice. The groups discussed the effects of racism and gender inequity, current issues and initiatives in Flint, and the type of programming that would be most effective to bring transformational change to our community.

Through these honest discussions, it became evident that a new approach was needed. In order to be responsive to our community needs, the group identified the importance of offering more in-depth sessions for leaders to learn about racism and how to make organizational changes as well as stand-alone workshops for relationship building, active listening, and storytelling to better understand others' lived experiences. In order to develop a curriculum responsive to our community needs, an advisory team was assembled, and, together with the consultants and YWCA Racial and Gender Equity Coordinator, Regina Laurie, the following programs were developed:

- **Racial Justice Transformational Leadership Academy:** a six-part module series with community leaders to raise awareness around racial inequities and their impact as well as to develop new systems and policies to facilitate equitable outcomes within organizations.
- **Racial Justice Workshops:** introductory and advanced sessions (**Challenging Racism 101 and 102**) focused on creating a shared language, developing strategies for effective listening and the skills for engaging in, and facilitating, difficult conversations. The series also includes **Facilitators Training** for individuals who have completed workshops 101 and 102 and would like to learn how to facilitate trainings.

## Women's Empowerment Center (WEC) UPDATE

We are excited to share that we made the following progress on the development of the WEC and its programs during FY 2021. Stay tuned for the official grand opening of the center in fall 2022.

- Raised 75% of the 1 million dollar capacity building goal through individual donations and grants
- Finalized design and renovation plans for the center
- Obtained evidenced-based educational curriculum for women's and girls' empowerment from YWCA USA and the One Circle Foundation
- Developed preliminary strategies for program assessment
- Began renovation of the Women's Empowerment Center space (2nd floor of current YWCA location)
- Outlined future programmatic components offered through the WEC:
  - **Life Coaching:** individual sessions to discuss needs, goals, and develop actions plans.
  - **Believing in You Mentoring Program:** one-on-one relationship with a mentor to discuss life issues and decisions, educational and career options, and create a network of support.
  - **Empower Workshops:** sessions for individual women as well as two generation family members (mother/caregiver/pre-teen or teen) focusing on understanding self-efficacy and self-esteem, leadership styles, communication and teamwork, healthy relationships, etc.
  - **Financial Literacy Workshops:** hands-on activities to introduce participants to everyday financial and budgeting decisions.
  - **Girls ASPIRE Leadership Program:** intensive week-long summer program series for girls entering 6th, 7th and 8th grade.
  - Hired Coordinator for Race and Gender Equity Programs
  - YWCA Staff and Board of Directors completed the Michigan Non-Profit Association's Diversity, Inclusion and Equity Assessment; results will be used to inform staff and board training, as well as the YWCA's strategic plan
  - YWCA Staff completed two workshops focusing on racial justice and social identities in fall 2021 as part of a training series on race and gender equity that will continue into 2022
