We are here and are stronger than ever! I am so pleased to share with you the highlights of our year! This has been a challenging year for all of us but it didn't stop the YWCA Greater Flint from serving the Greater Flint community and planning for the future!

Since my arrival as CEO three years ago, I have been awed and amazed by the selflessness, resilience and strength of the women I have been honored to meet. This report is a celebration of the people who are critical to our success...those who give their time, talents and treasures...generous donors, committed board members, volunteers and dedicated staff! You will read about their stories and "Y" they are a part of the YWCA Greater Flint.

Despite a state shutdown, the YWCA continued to operate its counseling and victim advocacy program, as well as the 32 bed SafeHouse for domestic violence victims and their children.

Through COVID 19-related grants, we were able to equip our staff with mobile devices so they could provide services virtually.

Sadly, domestic violence was on the rise during the height of the pandemic and the Flint area was not impervious to this. In June 2020, we experienced an increase of

200% in requests for personal protection orders and we are doing all we can to help these women.

In the fall of 2020, we launched a capacity-building campaign to establish a Women's Empowerment Center to better serve the women in our community. A group of dynamic women from the Greater Flint community were convened to serve on our Vision 2020 Committee and lead the charge of raising 1.5 million dollars. You will see more about this exciting initiative as you read on!

On behalf of the Board of Directors, staff, and the community members whom we serve, I would like to thank all of you for supporting our mission of eliminating racism and empowering women!

CURRENT INITIATIVES AT THE YWCA GREATER FLINT




THE HARRIET KENWORTHY COUNSELING AND ADVOCACY CENTER

Through the center, crisis counselors provide tools to empower survivors to increase their safety and lead lives free from violence. They also facilitate support groups, providing victims a safe place to learn and grow with others who have gone through similar situations. Victim Advocates provide information about the criminal justice system and support when victims attend court proceedings. They assist with filing personal protection order requests and work with local police jurisdictions who receive domestic violence and sexual assault complaints to ensure victims are receiving the services and support they need.

SAFEHOUSE SHELTER

The YWCA offers safe, emergency shelter for victims and children who are homeless as a result of intimate partner violence in our 32 bed facility. Residents receive support services such as counseling and advocacy, as well as assistance with finding permanent housing.



SAFE CENTER

In 2017, we began offering free rape examinations on site with 24-hour access to specially trained Sexual Assault Nurse Examiners (SANE). On average, we conduct 100 examinations annually.

CRISIS LINE (810) 238-SAFE

The YWCA 24/7 crisis line offers trained staff who are available to respond to victims, answer questions, provide information and referrals, and assist with the intake process for Safehouse for those in need of shelter.

SEXUAL ASSAULT RESPONSE TEAM (SART)

SART is a multidisciplinary group representing law enforcement, hospitals, and service providers who work collaboratively to ensure coordinated response and support for sexual assault victims in Genesee County.


STAND AGAINST RACISM

The Safehouse offers private bedrooms for families and individuals. Residents share a communal kitchen, dining and lounge space. Forensic examinations for sexual assault victims are completed in a specially equipped room in the SAFE Center.

am a survivor. At 22 years old, I was sexually assaulted. Like 81.3% of female victims of rape (attempted or completed), I was under the age of 25. Like 40.8% of female victims, I was acquainted with my attacker. Through the support of the YWCA's Victim Advocacy program, I found hope and solace. At 22, I could not imagine anything useful would come from my experience or that someday it would all come full circle.

It is not an easy thing to discuss. However, as a writer and an advocate, I understand the necessity and the power of sharing our truths. Our stories are a means of unifying and healing our communities and ourselves. They are not always pretty and light. Sometimes there's grit and darkness. There are also times when our stories seem insignificant or irrelevant. But I believe this: there is healing in the telling and as Bob Dylan once sang, "I go right where all things lost are made good again."

I had not created the circumstance but, like so many violated people, I blamed myself. I was mentally and emotionally unprepared to deal with the fallout of sexual assault. I was terrified the person who attacked me would return to take my life. Fear and anger kept me awake at night and mentally paralyzed during the day. I did not know where to begin the process of healing or seeking justice. I had to figure out how to keep the experience from consuming my life. Except, I did not know how to do that either.

I reflect now on that time in my life and celebrate my own willingness to find a path forward. I sought support

from the YWCA's Victim Advocacy program, and I remember the call as a moment of reckoning. It was a deliberate attempt to stand up for myself. I did not think of myself as brave; I was more afraid than I can articulate. But I was motivated by a desire to address my problem before it swallowed me whole.

I could not have known my experience would serve as a catalyst. I would not have imagined years later I would be invited to join the organization's Board of Directors. I did not imagine ever—not ever—I would be elected to serve as Vice President of the Board or that I would be invited to serve as co-chair of the organization's largest fundraiser—Circle Luncheon. Nonetheless, I am here and wholly committed to our mission to eliminate racism and empower women.

While the COVID-19 global pandemic affected nearly every part of our world and shattered any semblance of normality, the board members and staff at the YWCA Greater Flint have been determined to stay the course. For a time, delivery methods were modified, and safety measures were implemented, but the goals remained the same. Our commitment to women has yet grown despite the challenges of the times. As our CEO exclaims, "In collaboration with our community partners and friends of the YWCA, we are currently working on some exciting new projects around women's empowerment and racial and gender equity and look forward to expanding our services in the new year.... stay tuned!"

The Greater Flint YWCA is, indeed, "On the Move!"

I am a supporter of the YWCA Greater Flint because it is "the right thing to do." Supporting empowered and educated women and girls will help to break the cycle of poverty and strengthen our entire community to be healthier and safe for everyone. When women and girls are living safe, fulfilled, and productive lives they can reach their full potential—contributing their skills and talents to their families and the community.

The closing of a significant portion of car manufacturing, the Flint Water Crisis and most recently the pandemic have resulted in devastating circumstances, including:

- Poverty and high unemployment rates;
- Low high school graduation rate at 55%;
- Lack of affordable healthcare; and,
- Limited opportunities for skill development and envisioning a bright future!

As a national multicultural women's organization, the YWCA has served the Flint area for over 100 years, responding to the evolving needs of women and children.

We are uniquely positioned to take the lead in addressing the challenges women face today.

The Women's Empowerment Center (WEC) responds to what we know about experiences of women and the results of the Flint Women's Study by the Division of Public Health at Michigan State University. Most notably, study participants indicated they need mentoring, skill development, access to resources as well as a women's hub, a safe place to gather, learn and grow!

A SAFE PLACE TO GATHER, LEARN AND GROW

WOMEN'S EMPOWERMENT CENTER

Program initiatives through the WEC will include:

- Life coaching and referrals to community services;
- Self exploration and leadership skill workshops;
- Financial literacy programs;
- Racial and gender equity programming; and,
- Girl's ASPIRE Leadership program, a consecutive
 3-year summer program for girls entering 6th, 7th and 8th grades.

A center with multiple programs specifically for women and girls will be the first of its kind in mid-Michigan. We believe that through these initiatives, women and girls of Genesee County will be offered the information and resources needed to create a better future for themselves and their families.


